A Sogdian Dictionary (Sogdian, Persian, English). By B. Gharib, Ph.D., professor of old Iranian languages at the University of Tehran. Published 1992 by Farhang Publications, 2/52 Anoushirvan St., Tehran 15916, Iran. More than 9200 terms of this extinct Indo-European language are explained in English and Persian. English and Persian indices are included.

Some recent developments

LEXeter '83

Many developments have taken place since the first international conference of lexicography. The proceedings of the conference, some 65 papers, formed Volume 1 of the *Lexicographica Series Maior*. The three-volume encyclopaedia *Wörterbücher, Dictionnaires, Dictionnaires* (now complete) grew from plans discussed at that meeting. EURALEX, the European Association for Lexicography, was also set up at Exeter in 1983; the fifth EURALEX Congress was held at Tampere, Finland in August 1992. Dr. Hartmann, the current President of EURALEX, has recently carried out a survey of Lexicography in Europe for ESSE, the European Society for the Study of English, and produced a state-of-the-art article for the abstracting journal *Language Teaching*.

Dictionary Research Centre

Since its establishment in 1984, the Dictionary Research Centre at Exeter has attracted many visitors from this country and from abroad. Meetings which have been organised under its auspices include a Seminar on the History of Lexicography (1986) and a Workshop on Lexicography in Africa (1989). Several of the volumes in the *Exeter Linguistic Studies* series have been on lexicographical themes and a large number of postgraduate students have chosen lexicographical topics for their dissertations. The annual international lexicography course has become firmly established over the past five years, and InterLex 6 was held in April 1992. Two major database directories have been developed, an annotated Bibliography of Lexicographical References and a Who's Who in Lexicography, which it is hoped to expand as time and resources permit.

European Diploma in Lexicography

One important preoccupation has been professional training. An ERASMUS grant to a consortium of European universities led by the Exeter DRC has produced a Diploma/M.A. course in Lexicography taught jointly at the Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam, the Université de Lille III and the University of Exeter. The programme, which also involves a practical placement with a dictionary publisher, an ERASMUS student mobility grant and an externally moderated dissertation, will start at Exeter in autumn 1992. The third in a series of LEXeter scholarships is intended to help fund at least one place on this course.

InterLex 6 '92

The now traditional international lexicography course took place in Exeter from 5–10 April, 1992. Crossmead Conference Centre welcomed 22 participants from 12 countries all over the world with an opening reception and hosted them throughout the week of the course.

The programme included ten lectures which provided the theoretical content of the course. R. R. K. Hartmann (Exeter) gave a comprehensive lecture on dictionaries, lexicography and metalexicography, and also concentrated on various approaches to dictionary use and the interlingual dictionary. Tom McArthur (Cambridge) spoke about dictionaries in the context of their historical and cultural background and in terms of dictionary typology. He also focused on alternative dictionary formats, as well as on diverse entry formats.

The computer in dictionary making and the types of lexicographic evidence were the subject of Michael Rundell's (Longman) lectures. They were followed by a practical demonstration of excerpts from the spoken corpus of the BNC, and a CD-Rom version of the OED 2 by Steven Dodd (Exeter).

Finally, Paul Procter (Cambridge University Press) provided a look into the future of dictionary making. The course participants also had an opportunity to attend the Special Lecture on Euroclassisms given by Alan Kirkness (University of Auckland, New Zealand), which was followed by an optional Faculty of Arts lecture and seminar on the same topic.

The diverse approaches adopted by the course tutors – from the broad 'encyclopaedic' overview to the detailed practical handling of specific problems – were a major asset. Discussions after the lectures were open and constructive.

Morning lectures were followed by afternoon practical sessions where the participants could discuss problems they face in particular areas of their work. The presentations of participants with considerable lexicographic experience, which acquainted the audience with current projects and centred upon issues of broader relevance, as well as on

immediate operational problems in dictionary making, were of particular benefit to the younger and less-experienced participants.

A major theme throughout these sessions, and one that was touched upon from various points of view (of the monolingual, the bilingual, and the bilingualized dictionary), was that of cultural ‘translatability’ and to what extent a good dictionary could bridge the multivergence of natural languages.

In a fairly relaxed and informal atmosphere, participants were encouraged to set up personal contacts amongst themselves. They could also acquaint themselves with latest publications of various types of dictionaries and lexicographic writings, as well as with the *Exeter Linguistic Studies* series volumes, which could be purchased on request.

A word should be said about the efficient technical organization, which is not to be ignored when assessing the course’s success.

Diplome Europeen de Lexicographie (D.E.A. “Analyses et Theories Linguistiques”)

Université de Lille III (France)

L’U.R.A. SILEX (Unité de Recherches Associée au C.N.R.S. DO 382) propose pour la deuxième année consécutive une préparation au *DIPLOME EUROPEEN DE LEXICOGRAPHIE (D.E.L.)*, en relation avec le Dictionary Research Centre de l’Université d’Exeter et le Département de Lexicologie de l’Université Libre d’Amsterdam.

Finalité

Le D.E.L. offre une formation à visée professionnelle de haut niveau dans les domaines de la lexicographie et de la lexicologie.

Niveau de recrutement

- Maîtrise de lettres ou de langues ou diplôme équivalent: les candidats doivent satisfaire aux conditions d’inscription en D.E.A.
- D.E.A.: les étudiants sont dispensés des cours du tronc commun du D.E.A. et peuvent être dispensés du mémoire de recherche.

Durée des études

- 2 ans, comportant environ 200 h de cours pour le D.E.L., un stage de 2 mois minimum en relation avec la lexicographie et la rédaction d’un mémoire de recherche (qui peut être celui du D.E.A.).
- La première année de ce diplôme peut constituer l’une des options du D.E.A. “Analyses et théories linguistiques”.
- La deuxième année du D.E.L. est un diplôme d’université.

Programme de la première année

- TRONC COMMUN DU D.E.A. (pour les étudiants en D.E.A.): environ 20 h (voir la brochure du D.E.A.).
- D.E.L.: 5 modules de 20 h chacun:
 1. La typologie des dictionnaires et le marché lexicographique français (Michel Glatigny et Pierre Corbin).
 2. Informatique et lexicographie (Bruno Hémonnet et Ulrich Heid).
 3. La représentation du sens dans les dictionnaires (Danielle et Pierre Corbin).

4. La structure des dictionnaires monolingues (Pierre Corbin).
 5. La stratification sociale du vocabulaire (Michel Glatigny).
- STAGE: d'une durée de 2 mois minimum, à effectuer pendant les congés universitaires.

Programme de la deuxième année

3 modules:

1. Histoire de la lexicographie: 15 h (Michel Glatigny).
2. Lexicographie computationnelle: 15 h (Ulrich Heid).
3. Lexicographie et linguistique: 45 h (Anne-Marie Berthonneau, Danielle Corbin, Pierre Corbin, Pierre Cotte, Henri Portine, Marleen Van Peteghem).

N.B.: la deuxième année pourra aussi être préparée partiellement ou entièrement à l'étranger dans le cadre Erasmus.
